



If you are from one of the seven countries listed in the Executive Order
(Iran, Iraq, Sudan, Libya, Somalia, Syria, Yemen)

Refugee outside the U.S.	Anticipate a long delay of at least 6 months before your paperwork may be processed for entry, if your paperwork is already in process and was being considered. If you are from Syria, your ability to enter this country as a refugee has been suspended indefinitely.
Refugee inside the U.S.	It is strongly recommended that you do not leave the U.S.; you will likely be denied re-entry for at least 120 days and perhaps longer. If you are from Syria, your ability to re-enter this country as a refugee has been suspended indefinitely.
Visa applicant	Visa processing has ceased to nationals and citizens of the 7 listed countries and the Visa Interview Waiver Program has been suspended. Anticipate a delay of at least 90-120 days before your paperwork may be processed and/or your interview will be scheduled, and perhaps longer.
Visa holder outside the U.S.	Your ability to enter the country under your approved Visa has been suspended for, at least, 90 days. It is strongly recommended that you seek the advice of counsel before making plans to travel to the U.S.
Visa holder inside the U.S.	It is strongly recommended that you do not leave the U.S. Your ability to re-enter the U.S. under your approved Visa has been suspended for, at least, 90 days. It is strongly recommended that you seek the advice of counsel before making plans to travel outside the U.S.
Green card holder/lawful permanent resident (LPR) outside the U.S.	Your ability to re-enter using your green card has been significantly compromised. If you return to the U.S., you may face a delay in re-entry and some form of detention. It is strongly recommended that: (a) you let a

	<p>loved one know exactly what flight you are on and when you are expected to arrive; (b) carry the name and number of your attorney with you at all times; (c) instruct your loved one to call your/an attorney should you be delayed at the airport; and (d) have your passport and green card ready. Know your rights. Do not sign the I-407 and voluntarily abandon your residence status in the U.S. No matter how long you are held or if you are threatened, it is recommended that you keep calmly demanding to speak to your attorney and keep demanding a hearing in front of an immigration judge.</p>
<p>Green card holder/lawful permanent resident (LPR) inside the U.S.</p>	<p>Your ability to re-enter using your green card has been significantly compromised. It is strongly recommended that you seek the advice of counsel before making any plans to travel to the U.S. If you leave the U.S., you may face a delay in re-entry and some form of detention.</p>
<p>Dual citizens</p>	<p>Your ability to re-enter has been compromised. It is strongly recommended that you: (a) seek the advice of counsel before making travel plans; (b) bring your U.S. passport or lawful passport from a country other than one of the seven listed countries when you enter the U.S.; (c) have the name and number of your attorney with you at all times; (d) let a loved one know exactly what flight you are on and when you are expected to arrive; and (e) instruct your loved one to call that attorney should you be delayed at the airport.</p>
<p>U.S. citizens with U.S. passports with stamps or visas from one of the seven listed countries</p>	<p>If you leave the U.S. be prepared to be questioned when you re-enter the U.S. about the purpose of your trips to the seven listed countries, especially if you made frequent trips to one or more of those countries</p>
